FUFLED BY PRAYER AND FASTING

One of the times Jesus took His inner circle of Peter, James, and John aside. He took them to a setting we often refer to as the Mount of Transfiguration. In that moment, the trio get a glimpse of heaven in that they see Moses and Elijah both talking with Jesus. While there is great stuff to be gleaned from that moment, I want to draw your attention to that which happened after.

As they spent this special time with Jesus, having one of the ultimate mountain top experiences I can only imagine, I wonder about the depths of despair they felt as the descended the mountain. Upon their arrival, Mark tells us that the remaining disciples found themselves arguing with the crowd. The question comes to mind, what sparked the argument? It's only speculation on my part, but I wonder if the nine disciples at the foot of the mountain were embarrassed over their lack of power and

ability to bring healing to this child. Look at the story. When Jesus asked what the argument was about, the daddy of this young boy spoke up and actually says, "...I brought him to your disciples, and they could not heal him.". We'll never know the extent of the argument, but it strikes me the disciples of Jesus fell into the trap the enemy often sets for us. The enemy will point out our weaknesses to the world around us, and if we are not careful, we fall into the trap of having to defend ourselves, when the truth is, God may not have revealed His plan to us either. Sometimes we have to find ourselves in situations that require

mistake, it was an argument, and if the enemy can get the church to argue, either with the world, or within the body, then ministry is hampered, division is brought, and the enemy wins.

Once He hears the situation, Jesus has the child brought to Him, the child is set free, the family finally has rest, and the crowd is dispersed. I like to think the first time



Jesus spoke about faith in this episode, He was talking to the crowd, calling them "a faithless and perverse generation.". It is later when Jesus rebukes His disciples. (Mat 28:18-20)

In the early part of Acts, Jesus told His disciples to stay in Jerusalem until they were endued with power from on high. This promise of power was given throughout His earthly ministry and was fulfilled on the day of Pentecost, some 50 days after the ascension of Christ into heaven. Once the Holy Spirit was given, the disciples had a responsibility, and that responsibility is found,

not only in Matthew's gospel as we read earlier, but we find it in Luke's historical account of the early church in Acts 1:8

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you, and you will be my witnesses in Jerusalem and in all Judea and Samaria, and to the end of the earth."

This verse is key to our understanding today because it speaks to the responsibility of the church than and now. Maybe I can take it for granted that we in the church world understand we can only operate in power when we are endued with power from on high, in other words, if the church is going to be effective in ministry, she must understand that the presence of the Holy Spirit is mandatory. Otherwise we are weak and powerless against the forces of our enemy. But PRAISE GOD! He still yet empowers and equips the church for ministry, even in difficult times



THE MEANING OF **EASTER AND JESUS'** LOVE

Let's start at the death and bystanders thought that Jesus was calling out to Elijah the Prophet when he wasn't. Jesus was calling out for "Eli, Eli, lema sabachthani" which means "My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?" that Jesus shouted twice and the earth shooked. Everyone thought and spoke "this man truly was the Son of God." Before of Jesus' death the soldiers mocked him, taunted, and misunderstood Jesus. Yet. Jesus still died on the cross he was nailed to. (Matthew 27: 27-44), (Matthew 27: 45-56). At the burial of Jesus, was Joseph from Arimathea who became a follower of Jesus. disciples to get back on the boat to get to the other side of the lake to go home. Jesus kneeled and prayed at night, alone in the hills.

"REDEEMING THE DREAM" TRIP

Even while being mistreated and misunderstood, Jesus never stopped loving. And neither should we, even if it hurts, by

As I was asked to write for COGVA news: something about our church Mt. View COG, I had many things I thought about sharing, although like our Lord's brother Jude in his writing of his letter (the book of Jude) feel I should share something that has impacted my life in a significant way.

Early Monday morning October 8, 2018, a group of pastors, all from Lynchburg, embarked on a 5 day

and 4-night journey Danville, Atlanta, Tuskegee, Hayneville, Montgomery, Selma, Birmingham, and Memphis. This group of pastors of which I was privileged to be a part consisted of pastors from both black & white congregations. We had been meeting for prayer and racial reconciliation in the Lynchburg area.

Having been raised in the North, south central Pennsylvania area, I didn't know a great deal about the civil rights times, only the little I picked up on in school.

It was my desire and attitude that I wanted to learn as much as

possible, although not long into our journey did the Lord reveal to me that it was going to be an experience of more than just a learning history trip. First stop on Monday morning was in Danville Va., the site of "Bloody Monday". The group of pastors walked on the site of that fateful day which is right outside the Danville city offices, including the Police department. I'm not sure but I think it was about 5 minutes into our guide telling us of the incidents of that day when we saw on the porch of the police barracks the Chief of Police and his Captain standing on the porch. The Chief stood with his arms folded and the Captain with his hands fisted and on his hips. It

was obvious to us that they weren't too sure or even happy about a group of people (black & white) congregating there. When our guide returned from speaking to them, he said they were definitely concerned that something racially was going to happen. Well let me tell you it did happen that week, within myself and many of the pastors that went on that trip.

The trip was to be titled "Redeem the Dream", coming from Martin Luther King's "I Have a Dream" speech. By the end of the week, we were convinced it was the "Racial Healing" trip for each of us. One of the pastors on the trip was at "Bloody Monday" as a teen and (Continued on page 10)









was falsely arrested there. He was also on the steps of the Lincoln memorial when Dr. King gave his famous speech.

As I said earlier this was an experience for me. Tuesday morning, we arrived in Tuskegee. after a Monday afternoon visit in Atlanta to the home of Dr. King. About ten years ago I was introduced to George Washington Carver. I was given a book that had a chapter about this man and his influence and contributions to agriculture. I have been a life-long farmer. Vickie and I operated our own dairy farmer for 23 years before coming to Virginia to pastor Mt. View Church of God. As I was touring the George Washington Carver Museum, the Lord brought to my mind the influence this man had in my own life. I had put into practice many of things he had discovered and researched. Tuesday evening, we visited

Hayneville, Alabama (more bout Hayneville later).

Wednesday, we were in Montgomery Alabama, hurricane Michael hit about the time we were to tour the Legacy Museum and the heavy gray sky and heavy rain was once again God letting us experience the heaviness of the civil rights era. You had to be there to really know what I'm speaking of; it was a day of great heaviness.

Wednesday evening found us in an old Presbyterian church, a church which would not stand for civil rights whatsoever. That night in what was most likely the last service in that building ever (termites had eaten the foundation. Think about that, we asked if it was possible God sent the termites) we had a foot washing service where the white brothers washed our black brothers' feet. The Holy Spirit was very present & healing began in a

Godly way. It was a healing service to all.

Thursday, we traveled to Selma & Birmingham. Once again each had their own moving experience for me.

Friday took us to Memphis there we had a great Holy Communion Service, Even more healing came forth there.

As I bring this writing to a close, I want to say I didn't share everything I would like to here. Perhaps the greatest stir in me was Tuesday evening we visited Hayneville, Alabama. The place where an Episcopalian minister laid down his life for two young black girls. This is what Jesus beckoned us to do in John 15:13, "There is no greater Love than to lay down one's life for one's friends". Brothers & Sisters, we started some years ago to bring racial reconciliation. We must continue in that battle. It is definitely a continuing battle. As Charles Naylor wrote "Forward,

Forward! is the battle Onward, Onward! to our home on High..." Come let's fight together.

teaches them the power we have in prayer and fasting.

many of us go to as a matter of last resort, and some not at all. The fast God honors is that which brings us into a discipline of saying no to self, and yes to time with the Father as we explore His word and become more familiar with the entire Godhead. A fast that God honors

supplies the discipline of focusing on our relationship with Him.

So, as COGVA fasts and prays through these dark times, and churches individually fast and pray, and as we take on this discipline ourselves, may the Lord be pleased, first and foremost, and may we see the destruction of this virus, the church strengthened, and revival brought about in the hearts and lives of our world.

restored preacher named Peter preached what I like to call the first Camp Meeting Sermon of the Church of God!

As he preached, the Holy Spirit that empowered Him brought conviction on 3000 souls who were added to the Kingdom that day.

It was also through this empowering that a

lame man heard Peter say to him, Silver and Gold have we none, but such as we have, give I to you, In the name of Jesus, rise up and walk, and he took him by the hand, lifting him up and he went walking and leaping and praising God into the temple. A sad commentary on the church in the days of St. Thomas of Aquinas is this:

Entering the presence of Innocent II., before whom a large sum of money was spread out, the Pope observed, "You see, the Church is no longer in that age in which she said, 'Silver and gold have I none. "—"True, holy father," replied Aquinas; "neither can she any longer say to the lame, 'Rise up and walk.

I'm afraid some of that can be true today when we have rested on our own power to do what God has called us, or even done things in our own power under the guise of the Holy Spirit, and then ask for God's

blessings rather than His direction.

In the next few chapters, we see a measure of persecution come against the church, but apparently not enough for the church leaders as a whole to stress too much about. Peter and John are told not to proclaim Jesus' name. There is an attempt to squelch the voice of the church. But as I read it, when the persecution of the council was strong. 5000 souls were then added to the Kingdom.

With that kind of church growth, it is no wonder to me that these early apostles felt no compulsion to leave Jerusalem. When the church is growing locally, very few of us ever think that is the time to leave a local setting, but it occurs to me that God may have bigger plans for each of us than we've ever imagined, if we'd just follow His leadership and not get ahead of

But even in the midst of church growth, Satan rears his head, and he's had much practice at bringing discourse among the people of God. There's the story of Ananias and Saphira who lost their lives as they lied to the Holy Spirit, and yet, as the result of that story, many signs and wonders yet filled the church.

As we get closer to our text, the church, in its Jerusalem growth, Hometown ministry gone well, there is even a division among the saints concerning the distribution of food among the widows, resulting the in promotion of Stephen who becomes the first martyr.

All of this happens in Jerusalem. The church's original hometown. The place where they were given power for ministry, and what great things they have done. But. There's a but. We have no record of them

leaving town, What was their original mandate? When they receive power, the Holy Spirit, they were to be His witnesses in Jerusalem, but also in all Judea and Samaria, and to the ends of the earth. Depending on the commentary one uses, somewhere between 2-5 years pass between Acts 2 - 8. Any of that time is a long time to be cooped up in the hometown when the mandate was for world dispersion of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

It took a crisis in the life of the church to disperse the church.

It is the persecution of the church that propels the early church to move from it's comfort zone to proclaiming the Gospel in the places Jesus told them.

I don't completely understand this virus, but in a video, I put out to the Churches in Virginia last month, I reminded folks that what we have seen as evil, God has certainly been using for his good. For years, many

of us have been praying for revival. I am reading of journalists who are taking note of the spiritual awakening that is taking place in our country and around the world. I think it is a God thing to see more people being exposed to the gospel through a variety of means when it is not healthily safe to gather in large groups. I am watching with much excitement the ways in which the church has come out of her local settings, i.e. Jerusalem, and began to get creative in ways to proclaim Christ in innovative ways.

In the last few weeks, I have seen preachers take to the internet who have never dreamed they'd have a media presence anywhere. I've listened to the stories of churches who have feared a drop in their finances, only to see God provide in ways they were not expecting. I hear of people sharing the gospel from online presences and reaching more people

online than can be seated in their sanctuaries.

I like what one brother has shared with me, and it was his thought that the church has not closed, but she has been deployed, activated for ministry.

Today, I challenge you as church members to rise and be the church.
