Neace's Pieces – “Am I Good Enough?”

A lot of things go through a pastor's mind as they serve from one year to the next.

Often we wonder if we are “good enough”.

In my office is a box. Serving in pastoral ministry for almost 30 years, the box has grown. (Actually, I've added more boxes to the original.) In those boxes are cards, letters, drawings, pictures, texts, funeral bulletins, and other mementos of things that have happened in my ministry, most of which have come as the result of pastoral ministry throughout the year, without specific regard to Clergy

Appreciation Day. Those who have organizational skills would open those boxes and see a mountain of clutter that needs to be discarded. It is my hope to be able to hang on to those boxes, adding to them through the years, and saddle those who have charge of my estate with the burden of getting rid of them after my demise, but not before. The things found in those boxes will never mean to anyone else what they mean to me. You see, for every scrap of paper in the boxes there is a story, a reminder that the ministry of this pastor has been validated.

Validated, what does that mean? To validate something means to prove something's worth. Each of those scraps of paper, cards written or pictures drawn by a Sunday School student serves to remind me of my service to someone. When the enemy is able to get into the recesses of my mind and cause me to question my effectiveness, I need to be reminded I have made a difference in someone's life.

There is a story of a child walking along the beach in the early morning and finding through the night, the tide had washed up seemingly thousands of starfish. As the tide had gone back out, these starfish were left stranded, certain to die from the elements with which they found themselves unfamiliar. Starfish are only at home beneath the water, and without their

native environment, they will certainly die. As the child saw their plight, he started throwing the starfish into the sea. A stranger, seeing the young child, asked him what he was doing, and the child replied that he was trying to save the starfish. Seeing the magnitude of the task at hand, the stranger told the child he'd never be able to make a difference with so many stranded starfish. The child, undaunted, threw another starfish in the water, declaring to the stranger, “It made a difference for that one!”

Questions about time management, fundraising for ministry, priorities that need to be set, boundaries needing to be placed. What do my colleagues think of me? How am I doing in the context of the larger church? How am I doing in context with the church in the (Continued on page 3)

neighboring town, or even across the street. These are the questions that sometimes taunt me. It is at these times I bring out my box and rather than allow the enemy to beat on me with unrealistic expectations, I look in the box, pull out those mementos and am reminded, "I made a

difference for that one!" Pastors and others in leadership, always strive to serve the Lord as best you can, knowing He only asks our best, and once it is given, take comfort in knowing that as you serve Christ, your service makes a difference where you

are to someone. Church member, may I challenge you to be conscious of the service your pastor and others in church leadership provide for you, and help them to know, they make a difference for you throughout the year. If each of us, clergy and laity alike, will serve as best we

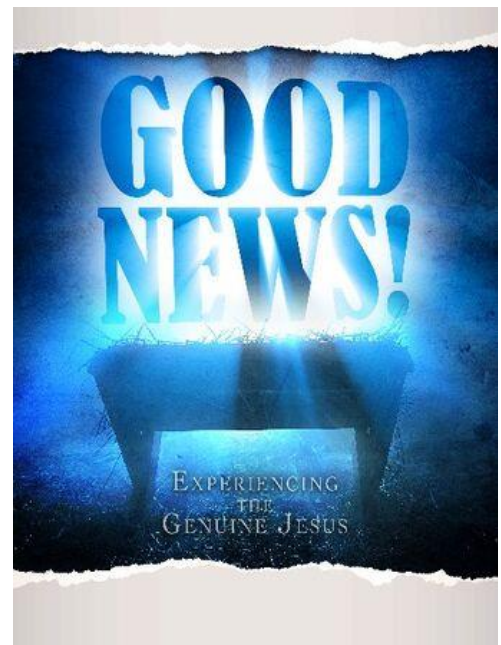
out to a broken, dark, and sinful world. They can also make them part of their mission projects.

Our Honduras Mission: Water's Edge Church



Our journey began by volunteering for specific reasons. We all shared the opinion that it was not about us. We were there to help the people of Honduras by bringing hope, medical attention, and the Word into their lives.

We arrived at the San Pedro Sulu International Airport in Honduras with various other churches and groups. We landed with returning Hondurans and each of our journeys took different paths. Our group had 11 people in it. We were from Waters Edge Church in Virginia Beach, VA and the Towne Church in Middletown, Ohio. Some

had been there before but this was my first time in Honduras and being on a Mission Trip. We meet our translator Kevin who ushered us to our awaiting passenger van. Leo was there as the coordinator and helped make this confusing time seem simple. We then drove through some of



the most beautiful countryside I have ever seen.

We travel through the cities, past lakes and mountains that were so green, alive, and breathtaking. The first stop after we ate was a roadside market selling fresh fruit, candies and local honey. We shared the juiciest pineapples. A guy chopped them in front of us. From there we continued going up until we reached the village of El Ocote which was to be our home for the next week. From the moment we arrived we felt so welcomed. Pastor Daniel and his congregation opened their lives and homes for us throughout the entire week. The Sunday morning service was for the children of the village. Their custom is to have a separate service

or them in the morning so they can join the whole congregation during the Sunday evening service. We sang songs and listen to the word taught by Sister Reina. Then we colored a dove that stated Espiritu Santa "Holy Spirit". The crayons given to the boys



and girls were barely stubs that would normally be thrown away but the excitement on their faces to be able to color was amazing. They did not whine about what they



were given but were so excited to share with us and they colored the doves beautifully.

The church has just one large room. It is in the middle of the village with the congregation worshipping three times during the week. There was no huge production as some congregations have back in the USA. (Continued on page 5)

Everyone came together to hear the Word from God. Their songs were all in Spanish with just a keyboard and drum set but that did not stop any from feeling Him with us and in us. Our translators Robert and Kevin helped translate the Words being taught, the thanks and the prayers. There was no language barrier while in their church. It felt like we were all one.

Our main mission for the trip was to provide the village with completed chicken coups. Those receiving one had been given supplies to build the frame before our arrival. We helped attach the chicken wire and provided each family with twelve laying hens. One of the families receiving a coup had never been to church. Through the grace of God, the way He works, and one of the most amazing times while there, the family showed up for the next church services.

One of the most memorable moments was when we were part of a Mission within our Mission trip. Pastor Daniel took us to another

remote village where he had helped bring the Word and change to them. We were shown their school, were every child in the village attended. This is unusual for the area. They talk and showed us their plans of fixing their old-style homes, into better versions that will provide longer lasting shelter. They also explained that they now received filtered water throughout their village to help combat some of the diseases from drinking the water straight from the mountain. It was wonderful to see that by



helping one group of people they were then reaching out and helping others too.

We experienced so much from helping the people and being a part of their church. We also got to

enjoy and learn more about the beautiful country. We hiked to the top of a river where the water came directly out of the mountain. We zipped lined over a waterfall and then we went underneath it. We enjoyed a meal provided by the mayor who talked about a future project of making a safe path for the kids to walk to the local school. We went to the local swimming hole to cool off and jump from bridges. We visited the Heart to Honduras compound. We played football (soccer) at a local arena. We learned to



make bread. Just seven day later, each group that arrived, left the same way, with a new group arriving to continue the work. This is the life of Missions in Honduras.

We all arrived for our own reason of volunteering and helping. I am sure each one of us left with more than we thought we could bring to the people of Honduras. I know that I brought back a thought of peace and understanding that the Word is the strongest thing no matter how much or little we have in life. We are all created equal and need to help those around us, as they help us and others.
