NEACE'S PIECES

Have you ever heard a pastor say, "Stop giving!?" Yeah, me either. But it happened in Scripture. Exodus 36 begins the narrative of the actual building of the tabernacle.

At the burning bush experience, God makes a promise to Moses that after the Exodus of Israel from Egypt, he would serve Him on the mountain upon which he currently stood. God fulfills this promise in the Exodus chapters of 19 – 31. (There is a break in this worship experience for Moses when the people at the foot of the mountain get restless and we have the story of the golden calf, but that focus is an item for a future Neace's Pieces.)

Chapter 36: 2 says this: "And Moses called Bezaleel and Aholiab, and every craftsman in whose mind the LORD put skill, everyone whose heart stirred him up to come and do the work." From there, as Moses has given the instructions, we find through the end of the book, not a repetition of the instruction for the sake of repetition, but an accounting of the actions which

showed Moses's adherence to God's word and direction for the building of a tabernacle. In that narrative, we find, among other things, the following:

1. Moses sets a clear vision for the people. Moses had spent time with the LORD. Actually, the people to whom Moses was tasked to lead assumed Moses to have abandoned them because of the amount of time he's spent on the mountain with the LORD. In that time, Moses worshipped, God honored, and received direction for the structure that would house the articles to aid in worship, (atoning sacrifices and celebration) and would be a physical reminder of the presence of God among His people.

2. He allowed those with talent to lead. Bezaleel and Aholiab were men gifted by God in the areas of architectural skills, and weaving/embroidery. The responsibility of these two included their gifting, but also their oversight as they taught others to do the necessary physical work of carpentry and tapestry work, creation of oils and perfumes required for worship, and the setting of precious stones in the priestly garments.

As we follow this episode of history, mind the fact of Moses tasking Bezaleel and Aholiab with responsibility, and then freeing them to do their ministry. Moses had received the instructions and shared those instructions with the people. He then found the men God had placed in leadership with Moses, and Moses gave them the freedom to serve. It is interesting to note that the first reference to a human being filled with the Spirit of God came in describing these two men as they are called to their giftedness in the 31st chapter.

3. The received gifts that were not simply materialistic – There were various needs for the building of this tabernacle. When we think of offerings, many times our minds go to fund-raising. While that may be true in our society, we must

remember where Moses and these people were. At the foot of Mt. Sinai, funds raised to purchase that which might be needed for the project would have been useless. There would have been no place to purchase acacia wood, linen for tents and garments, or thread for sewing. Offerings brought for this project were practical in nature. Indeed, gold, silver, brass, and precious stones were offered, but each of these had to be repurposed from its previous fashion in that which could be used in the service of the LORD (another sermon idea... hmm).

But in addition to the material needs, skill and time were valuable offerings to the LORD. Without time dedicated by the people, all the material goods would have just been piled up, and thus become of no value.

When Moses puts out the call that the time to start this project is upon them, and Moses has set this vision, Exodus 35: 22 says, "and so they came, and brought (the items and talents necessary for the completion of the tabernacle)" After which, Bezaleel and Aholiab begin their work. In the midst of all of the trappings, the scripture says in chapter 36, the people continued to give daily to the tabernacle construction, and the craftsmen have to tell Moses, "the people give too much..." Oh for a problem such as this! Moses tells the people to stop giving, for the need at the moment had been met, and even surpassed. In a year's time, through the blessing of obedience to God's word, the sacrifice of giving treasure, talent, and time, the tabernacle is completed.

Some of my takeaways from this is that obedience to a clear vision from God must precede successful ministry. We see it here and throughout church history. When God sets a vision for the leadership, it is imperative that others be enlisted in the vision, especially if that gifting is different than our own.

When God places a vision within the church, He will also supply every need in order for it to be accomplished. We serve a God who has the worlds wealth at His disposal, and as we are obedient in our giving, He will honor that for both the receiver and giver. And lastly, as the people of Moses day, and the people of COGVA begin to catch vision from God and work together, there is no end to what can be accomplished in the Kingdom.

Ministry Partnership with Seniors Unlimited Lifestyles, Inc.

Seniors Unlimited Lifestyles, Inc. (SULI) <http://www.sulicare.com/> is a 501(C) (3) non-profit organization based in Virginia Beach, Virginia. SULI was founded in 2004 by Bellamy Avenue's Angela Whitehead. As CEO, Angela leads SULI in fulfilling its vision of providing a



clean, safe, affordable living environment with care and dignity for low income seniors and disabled citizens. In November 2019, Bellamy Avenue Church of God was a proud recipient of an award for its commitment and financial sponsorship during SULI's annual fundraising

gala. We are proud to support and participate fully in this ministry.

In 2006 Virginia Community Development Corporation (VCDC), Richmond, Virginia, began working with SULI in the development of affordable housing for senior citizens. SULI spent several years searching for a location suitable for seniors and the disabled. In 2012 Community Housing Partners Corporation of Christiansburg, Virginia, partnered with Seniors Unlimited Lifestyles, Inc. to provide their construction, architectural and property management expertise in the development of an independent living, affordable apartment complex — Tranquility at the Lakes. In 2016, SULI broke ground on its first facility located on Burton Station Rd. in Virginia Beach, Virginia. In 2017, Tranquility at the Lakes, a 40-unit affordable, independent senior and disabled living complex was move-in ready.

Outreach to St Helena Elementary School

St Helena's student population consists of 290 children from low to moderate income families in the Berkley community. Bellamy's outreach



committee contacted the parent/teacher coordinator to identify specific needs that our church could assist with. Hats and gloves were identified as a

pressing need as most of the children walk to school, often lacking these items in the winter months. In November 2019, Pastor Peterson and Deacon Hargrove met with Ms. Cathy Broadnax, parent/teach coordinator at SHES, to deliver 120 sets of hats and gloves, snacks for the school's Fall Festival, and a Thanksgiving Basket to a needy family. In 2020, Bellamy Avenue has committed to sustaining its outreach to St Helena Elementary school.

2019 Bellamy Avenue Man of the Year

On October 5-6, Bellamy Avenue Church of God held its annual Men's Day program. This year's activities included hosting the COGVA Quarterly men's training on Saturday followed a Men's Day special service on Sunday.

On Saturday, we conducted a workshop entitled, "Reaching Young Men for Christ Through Effective Evangelism." 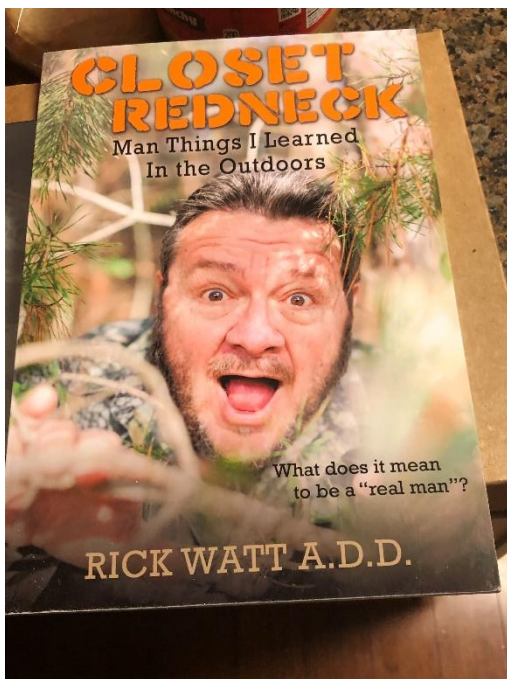


Ministries. The desired outcome of this workshop was to develop a plan of action to fulfill Christ's command to become fishers of men. Rev. Dr. Simeon R.

SO, WHAT DOES A RETIRING PASTOR DO IN RETIREMENT? - Pastor Rick Watt



There are probably many answers to the above question, but I will give you my plans (Pastor Rick Watt) which I believe God is directing me to pursue.

For one thing, I would like to go for weekend seminars to churches of 25-70 people to bring insights on a Saturday night and Sunday morning as to how a church that feels like they've hit-a-wall can set out to win souls and increase the body of Christ to pass that 100 person barrier. I believe that God doesn't count numbers, but I also believe that when you're winning souls, it should show in your attendance. The goal isn't numbers, but souls come in bodies, so spiritual

growth and effective ministry by the pastor and laity together should result in numerical growth.

When I came to Riverside First Church of God in Fredericksburg, we had about 70 people. When those people took their equipment (see Ephesians 4:11-12) into the places where they lived in the community, people began to be won to Christ and to come to the church. This is one of the ministries I would like to share as a retired pastor. Call me.

The other major ministry I will be challenged with is to speak to Men's Groups, Christian Hunt Clubs, and Churches, ministering to the challenges of being an effective Christian man where we live. Using my book, "Closet Redneck... Man Things I learned in the Outdoors", I would conduct weekend seminars or speak at Wild Game Dinners and/or men's retreats concerning "men's issues" that we tend to deny having. For instance, a man may say, "I don't care whether people like me or not." Two things emerge from this statement. One is that if we aren't likeable, kind, gentle, patient, then are we really walking in the Spirit? How will we influence others for Christ? The 2nd is the assurance that if not everyone liked Jesus, they will very possibly not like us. Paul warned Titus and Timothy not to let people despise them. Not everyone is going to like you. The book and the seminar will equip men to truly lead their families in Godly authority which is established in love and caring.

I just received a call from a large church in Pennsylvania, asking me to speak at a Wild Game Dinner... and I really haven't officially put the word out, yet.

Do I ache in leaving the Fredericksburg flock? Yes, absolutely. I did not leave in any dissension or frustration. I simply felt that God showed me (Continued on page 7)

that my work there was finished, and God has another chapter for my life and ministry.

We had an incredible service, passing the torch to our new pastor, Brian Harrell, as we washed one another's feet. Brian has now moved here from Parkersburg, WV. Ya'll welcome him as you meet him. He was involved in Church of God ministry in

West Virginia and brings experience and insight to share with us here, in Virginia.

Could I use your prayers? Absolutely. This is very difficult, adjusting to a total change in ministry, adjusting to the people whose lives have been wrapped up in ministry and friendship for over ten years here in Fredericksburg. Please pray for Marsha and me. Having her in my life is one of God's greatest gifts to myself and our ministry.

A wood wall was added, the same as one in the church, with wood that came old handmade pallets donated by another church member whose family owns the local orchard where they were made. Church members did some painting and decorating, and also donated all the furnishings and supplies to get us started.

The space has been used as a gathering place for some church and community meetings. The COVE on Main will have 4 open houses Feb. 10, 17, 24, 28 from 8 - 12 am and will officially open March 2 Monday through Friday from 8-12. Additionally, the COVE on Main will host a coffee with the mayor event, community classes and Bibles studies as well as meetings and will offer counseling in evenings.
